Scholarships

IIC supported **10** scholarships to participate in the online programme with preference for IIC members.

IIC was particularly keen to support individuals in priority regions and emerging economies especially **Latin America** and **Caribbean**, **Africa** and **SouthEast Asia**. This reflects its commitment to making opportunities for learning and professional development more widely available, and affordable, across every region of the world. The IIC sponsored places were open to students engaged in a university or learning programme for conservation, as well as early career practising conservators currently engaged in either a public or a private capacity.

Scholarships were also offered to Syrian young professionals under the Regione Piemonte Cooperation project Enhancing skills for Heritage Conservation 2022-2023: Piemonte - Syria Knowledge Exchange.

Fellowships

Six winners of a Call for Training had the opportunity to live a unique experience in one of the majestic Savoy Royal Residences in Piemonte from 28, 29 and 30 June 2023!

The winners participated in "Preservation protocol for collections in Historical Residences", the final workshop organised by the CCR dedicated to preventive conservation and the final in presence event. Call for Training was reserved for those who had attended the FULL course or had been awarded an IIC, Amici del CCR or Regione Piemonte Scholarship.

The fellowships were sponsored by **Fondazione Magnetto** and **IIC**.

In addition, YPF awarded a fellowship, sponsored by **Regione Piemonte**, for two candidates coming from Syria presenting a focused on risk asset protection project in crisis areas.

The winners joined the Young Professionals Forum 2023 and

were the protagonist of the opening of new relationships and different cultural and professional perspectives, perfect ambassador of the values that the Young Professionals Forum supports: openness, internationality, dialogue between cultures, desire to experience different and distant realities and to identify common reasons for exchange and growth.

An extra prize was awarded during the final event.

The jury decided to reward a participant by giving free access to the CCR Digital Lab, the platform of the SAF - The Advanced Training and Study School, for six months with the aim of supporting her training programme, providing contents and tools.



Art historian, she studied at the University of Turin and at the Scuola Normale Superiore in Pisa.

She has participated in research projects on the history of restoration and on museums and archives of the 20th century. Since 2006, she has worked at the Conservation Restoration

Center Foundation "La Venaria Reale," where she has been in charge of the **field** of conservation of contemporary works of art, paper and photography and ceramics, glass and metals.

She oversaw the acquisition of archival funds related to the history of contemporary art (Martano Gallery Fund) and the history of restoration (Pinin Brambilla Archives). Former director of the Organization and Development area, she coordinated the Center's multi-year strategic plan on the three axes dedicated to Internationalization, Innovation and Culture. Since 2020, she holds the position of Secretary General of the CCR.

He is in the Scientific Committee of Brescia Musei Foundation, in the Board of Directors of Federculture, the Federation of Public Services for Culture, Tourism, Sport and Leisure; in the Board of Directors of Museum Ruffoni Foundation, Isola Pescatori, Stresa. He was Director General Culture and Cinema of Regione Lombardia (2010-2013); President of ICOM Italy (2010-2014), President of the Organising Committee of ICOM General Conference in Milan (2016); in the Board of Directors of the National Museum of Palazzo Ducale in Mantua (2015-2020), President of Museo del Paesaggio in Verbania (2021-2022). He delivers lectures at universities and international conferences and has been widely published in Italian, English, French and Spanish.






Valerie Magar, ICCROM, Unit Manager Programmes

She holds lectures and courses in various universities, both Italian and foreign. She has guest lectured at the University of Leicester Museum Studies department and contributed as an engagement advisor for a major five-year interdisciplinary research project, Understanding Everyday Participation, funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council. Sarah has over 15 years of experience in museums and heritage regeneration including as a sustainability champion and working at Chief Executive level in the charity and environmental sectors.



CONCEPT:

Traditional knowledge, heritage, and cultural practices, according to the Global Research and Action Agenda, can serve as a bridge between different ways of knowing, embody inherited knowledge accumulated over generations, and serve as entry points for innovative and inclusive climate action solutions. This necessitates acknowledging, respecting, and implementing a variety of recommendations, **traditional and innovative solutions inherent in culture**, heritage, and creative practices. These must interact with industry and be part of integrated planning methods.

Based on this assumption, the Italian National Committee of ICOMOS is developing a baseline discussion of complex narratives that have provided scope for more meaningful discourse during the 2021-2023 triennium on "Heritage Changes"; theme of the International Day of Monuments and Sites 2023, in collaboration with the ISC CIF and the ISC ICORP and the Italian Section of the Group of Emerging Professionals.

The seminar was organized around an introductory session in which experts will present case studies to the audience (Appia Regina Viarum). Participants were encouraged to submit points/topics to be addressed via a pre-circulated questionnaire during the second session.



CONCEPT:

According to the latest publication of INTERCOM (ICOM International Committee for museum management) MUSEUM LEADERSHIP: TAKING THE PULSE 2021, living in a changing world require to understand how museums are dealing with new challenges and how their leaders are building resilience and capacity building in their institutions.

It is common ground that leadership at an institutional and political level must take every opportunity to invest in preventive conservation. Museums are facing several situations of vulnerability directly connected with poor risk-management practice and unpreparedness of institutions to meet huge challenges: it is necessary to **develop leadership**, **strategic and capacity building skills** as well as specific interdisciplinary skills.

On-going professional training for museum professionals in all areas is perceived as a necessity and it is important to emphasize the importance of investment in this area. Upper management should allocate appropriate resources for staff training, to **develop interdisciplinary skills**.

The support for museum leaders includes mentorships and training, international support networks and the exchange of best practices. Leadership has been identified as an important factor, which could strengthen or weaken the **strategic management** and everyday work of every cultural institution. The workshop aimed to provide a picture of how museum professionals stand in such a challenging environment and how to support them.

CONCEPT:

The need is to provide workshop participants with an introductory moment for knowledge preventive conservation from a disciplinary and thematic point of view.

The observation of **museum collections** in their "environment system" is the foundation of a **preventive conservation protocol** at the basis of which there is a double process for the knowledge to recognize the phenomenologies of the degradation of collections to connect them to possible causes.

Collection of all data, supported diagnostic activities, will lead to the subsequent definition of priorities of intervention. The corrective strategies could be addressed both to the "environment system" (mitigation actions of environmental and anthropogenic risks) to the works contained in it (maintenance plans), in an optical **global conservation** aimed both at the goods and the needs of an open historical residence to the public.

In the second part of the activity we will reflect on the preventive conservation



of outside that can not avoid taking into account the **predominant role of the environmental context** which, being an integral part and characterizing the system, actively participates in the process of decay of the work.

In conclusion we will address the **issue of communication** as a key to spread the culture of prevention not in the forms of a dissemination, but as a development of **a social responsibility** that provides the **interaction between cultural, tourist and economic actors** and the needs of the territory, with the objective of benefits ranging from the development of new skills, to the improvement of purposes research and the promotion of forms of co-design for an interdisciplinary approach to conservation.







During the final event the six young fellows shared with the international community **"In our hands"** the video they made during the workshop, in which they tell the mathematical formula of preventive conservation they developed during the three-full time days of activities.

"If we want to describe preventive conservation with a formula, we would have to subtract the risks from the sum over time of three 3M: Monitoring + Maintenance + Management, multiplied by Study and Actions.

The solution is in our hands!"

CONCLUSION

The preventive conservation and how leadership, strategy and networking can operate on it was the focus of the activities proposed in this Young Professionals Forum 2023.

The main objective of the Forum was to enable cultural heritage professionals to be more easily positioned in the workplace, thanks to the skills acquired and the networks created.

Manywerethetopicsaddressedthisyear: from **risk management** to **contextual analysis**, from creating awareness on critical points about the **evaluation of impact,** to documentation and communication activities.

This year's edition explored the great theme and challenge of climate change in relation to cultural heritage protection, conservation, and management as well as the different values of heritage for local communities and how they can be involved.

Each partner declined activities and highlighted different aspects related to preventive conservation: participants discussed the importance of leadership to enrich and hence involve others with the conservation of cultural heritage, new challenges, and future opportunities together with the current guidelines and policy to better manage and preserve tangible and intangible heritage.

Communication and awareness were the core of the final workshop organized by the CCR.

"In our hands" is the evocative title chosen for the video that summarizes the three-full time days at Venaria in which participants have highlited with a mathematical formula all the aspects involved in the preventive conservation: monitoring, maintenance, management, studies and actions.

The result reached after this complex and rich path is that the interdisciplinary approach, scientific studies, humanistic components and awareness must cooperate to consolidate generations of young heritage professionals.

This complexity cannot be ignored: this is the key to always seeking new solutions to the problems we will face.

On this occasion the CCR, together with Piemonte Region and partners involved, awarded **two fellowships for candidates coming from Syria** and one extra prize.





It was an incredible opportunity because this year it was in presence so it gave us even more the possibility to learn from the work made at CCR laboratories and inside Reggia regarding preventive conservation. At first we took four introductory lessons on preventive conservation history (De Blasi), degradation factors and programmed preservation protocols (Genta), risk management (Nervo) and Integrated Pest Management with the presentation of the Reggia case study (Matteucci). The complexity of collection monitoring and maintenance in historical residences was very well presented and we understood how preservation protocols that dictate precise and continuous work are necessary. There was also the time to introduce ourselves having coffee and since the very beginning we felt that between all of us there would be harmony in working together."



KONSTANTINA ELMALOGLOU

"On day 2 of the workshop, Mr. Tomaso Ricardi di Netro, the art historian responsible for the Royal Residences, welcomed us in the Reggia and gave us information on its history, past restoration phases and current public engagement. Following a coffee break, Roberta Genta. Textiles conservator at the Centro Conservazione e Restauro Venaria Reale and a member of the conservation team at the Reggia, introduced us briefly on risk assessment methods and on approaches for collecting and analysing our data. As we were walking through the Reggia's magnificent interior, we were taking short videos, which best described our experience and the ideas we wished to communicate for our final group assignment. By looking into each room's exposure to agents of deterioration and the higher susceptibility of certain objects, we were asked to think about the simple actions that a conservator should take in order to respond to different case scenarios. We learned about setting priorities and making effective maintenance and risk management plans. As a team we discussed different aspects of preventive conservation protocols and exchanged opinions in a relaxed but rather interesting environment that had a lot to teach us."



MARIA CARMELA GRANO from Italy

Winner of the 2023 fellowiship sponsored by Fondazione Magnetto

"Before participating in the workshop on the "Protocol for the conservation of collections in Historic Houses", I was sure that it would only concern internal parameters, while the conservation of outdoor monuments would not be the focus of attention. But I was wrong. There are many open-air monuments to look after in the marvellous and enormous gardens of the Venaria, such as fountains, statues and contemporary installations. We strolled through the gardens with the stone conservator Mariclaire Canepa, who showed us the new monitoring plan of the fountain, the brick walls of the nymphaeum, and the monuments. This outdoor activity started just a year ago by recording the state of conservation, looking for salt, dust, and fractures to catalogue the processes of alteration and degradation. This is a seasonal monitoring still in progress, which obviously takes into account climate data (from local environmental monitoring) and I look forward to seeing the resulting correlations and the next conservative proposal from the CCR experts. I am also very interested in the results of monitoring a contemporary marble monument made by the artist Pinone in the gardens, which shows a very strange discoloration, with phosphorescent orange spots, very challenging. I'd be delighted to further my research and work in conjunction with the CCR experts to ensure adequate protection of outdoor monuments."



MARTINA SCOCCIMARRO from Argentina

Winner of the 2023 fellowiship sponsored by IIC - International Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works

"On the last day we carried out the final task of the workshop: we had to describe the importance of preventive and programmed conservation with the aim of communicating it to the public. After a moment of discussing and sharing our ideas, combining the knowledge we had acquired during the previous days with our professional experience, we came up with a scientific formula to explain the importance of the different factors involved in preventive and programmed conservation tasks. Our idea with this message was to make everyone feel involved and responsible for the conservation of cultural heritage, focusing on collaboration and regular maintenance actions as key factors to contribute to limit the loss of history and cultural identity in the future. This activity concluded with the presentation of a video featuring images recorded by us during our visit to the Reggia and the Fountain of Hercules, with a voice-over explaining our scientific formula and inviting the public and conservation professionals to participate in this important task. The video was presented at the Final Virtual Event held on the same day, which included presentations from all those involved in the YPF virtual workshop."

"During this three day immersion, we had the chance to learn and cooperate with other esteemed professionals, students and researchers who greatly contribute to the preservation and valorization of cultural heritage. Being part of the YPF was an enriching and fulfilling experience, which taught all of us not only about the skills and protocols involved in conservation of historical residences, but also about the importance of soft skills, leadership and cooperation to plan effective solutions in heritage conservation. The theoretical lessons perfectly aligned with the practical activities held on the Savoy Residences, with a guided visit to the interiors of the palace, its collections and gardens, in which we could learn to identify its main agents of deterioration beforehand, and see the effects of the application of the preventive conservation protocols. By engaging with other young professionals from different cultural and educational backgrounds, I could expand my network and broaden my perspectives, and I am deeply thankful to the CCR for making this experience possible. "During the final workshop of YPF23 called Preservation Protocol for Collections in Historical Residences, I expanded my interests and knowledge before aimed mainly at museum collections. Indeed many of the Italian museums are collocated into historical buildings where the decorative elements contribute to enrich the tour of different objects and materials, which in addition to the works on display must necessarily be the subject of care and conservation. In addition, to increase the risk factors, are often the intrinsic characteristics of the building itself, namely its architectural structure and the layout of the interior spaces. It is therefore extremely important to be able to have a broad overview to propose conservative plans and appropriate management strategies able to minimise risk factors and degradation.

Although in the scientific debate, the themes of preventive conservation and programmed maintenance are particularly felt in these years, the preservation and maintenance of museum collections is not based on a structured plan, but is still of an extraordinary type with remedial conservation interventions. For this reason, my wish is to create a protocol, supported by computer and digital instrumentation, that can help museum staff to organise and manage preventive conservation plans and programmed maintenance to become part of the daily activities of museum management. Last year, I attended a II level specialising in Museology, Museography, and Management of Cultural Heritage. In my research project, I presented a plan for preventive conservation and programmed maintenance of the artefacts in the Picture Gallery and Storage 19 of the Correr Museum in Venice. As a pilot project, it started in September 2023 with the monitoring of the microclimatic parameters of the Picture Gallery and the analysis of the state of painting conservation. In the future, it is planned to be extended to the whole Correr Museum, and the other museums of the Venice Civic Museums Foundation. I hope it will be the starting point for making this professional objective and that the necessary funds can be found for the development of such a project."



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
